


Let us remind you of the opportunities at school to help

FameLab

Recently, Year 9 students spent their time in science lessons working towards FameLab Academy UK, a schools initiative which seeks to revolutionise science communication in schools.



Each student was required to prepare a three minute presentation to explain a scientific topic on an area of their choice and then delivered it in a dynamic and engaging way to their class.



The class teacher selected the best ones, and after a 'Semi-final' round, nine students then competed in the FameLab Final by presenting their talks to their whole year group.

The students had practiced and learned their talks by heart, and showed incredible confidence in presenting to their peers.

Topics ranged from muscles, to planes and the atom. Although all students presented brilliantly Leon Lukes was selected as the winner by the

panel of judges. Leon's fascinating presentation was on the use of music as a form of torture. Runners up were Nathaniel Regel, posing the question: what would happen if everyone in the world jumped at once and Elise Workman delved into mass hysteria.

Leon will now represent the school in the interschool FameLab Academy Final, and the remaining finalists will attend the event to support him. Good luck Leon!

DataFace

DataFace enables young people to tell the stories they care about through the gathering and presentation of data. DataFace equips teachers and students with the skills and confidence to interrogate





data – big and small – and present their findings creatively.

During the first week of term Sarah Cooksley and Karen Morris from Dataface introduced a competition where students use data sets to create a physical model showing a story about the data that they have unearthed.

This competition is running in Year 9 lessons and will be judged across the whole year with the winner presenting their model at the Cheltenham Science Festival.

KS3 Maths club – This term maths club have been focussing on maths in art, creating art by accurately drawing polygons with maths equipment then using measured lines within the shape to create a picture, creating an illusion within the shape. Some students accurately drawing shapes using a protractor for the first time which has been testing but very rewarding.

Cipher club – This term in cipher club we have been looking at morse code. Decoding sentences from morse code and writing our own words and phrases in morse code for our peers to crack. The students have been fantastic at recognising the patterns and most frequent letters in text to enable more efficient methods of decoding.

On Wednesday 12th March, our talented Year 8 and 9 students took to the stage at the Tewkesbury Roses Theatre to perform Shakespeare's As You Like It and what a performance it was! For some of our students this was their first time stepping onto a professional stage, making their achievement even more incredible. The evening was a true celebration of their dedication, creativity, and passion for the performing arts.

Since October these dedicated students have been working tirelessly in rehearsals, refining their understanding of Shakespearean language, perfecting their stage presence and mastering the technical aspects of theatre, from managing props to embodying their characters with confidence. Learning to interpret Shakespeare's words is no small feat but the cast embraced the challenge wholeheartedly, delivering their lines with clarity and expression, ensuring that the audience was fully engaged from start to finish.

The production itself was a triumph with every element coming together seamlessly. On Monday, 27th January, the school again remembered the Holocaust through Holocaust Memorial Day.

In the preceding week, students read the story of Mala Tribich, a Holocaust survivor born in Poland, and her brother, Ben. Students were asked how the story made them feel and the possible lessons to be learnt from this. They compared Mala's story with that of another survivor, John Hajdu, considering how his experiences differed from hers.

Holocaust Memorial Day is an opportunity for our students to also learn about other, subsequent genocides, of which Rwanda, Cambodia and Bosnia are examples, among others.

The theme of this year's Holocaust Memorial Trust being 'For a better future', students were encouraged to 'read-on' to consider the commitments they could make to ensure we do have a better future.




Goodbye for now...
